Course Description

This is a studio course in which students will be introduced to computer imaging and online media. Students will learn to use the digital imaging software, create design, and apply it to online media.

Primary Software Used: **Adobe Illustrator, Photoshop, and XD**
Levels: Undergraduate

Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will learn how to::

- Develop and use a vocabulary of computer graphics and design terminology
- Apply visual design principles across an online media.
- Create vector icons for clear visual communication
- Edit and retouch photographic images
- Manipulate still images and make it into an animation
- Lay out text and images to create efficient and visually satisfying communication
- Create a digital portfolio for online media

- High quality digital(or cell phone) camera

Also, maintain the unity and consistency in this set of characters. Outcome should be one set of icons of 5 different characters.

ASSIGNMENT 1.1 :

2. Create a mood board from the original illustration.
3. Create a mood board for character icons of your interest.
4. Generate thumbnail sketches for 5 characters then refine them as much as possible.
5. Create a concept board with 2, 3, and 4. In this document, the title of the story and character's name has to be included.
